A New Day Dawns in Lakewood

Foundation, Newsletter Debut

With this premiere issue of *The Foundation Light* the Lakewood Masonic Temple Family enters an exciting new era.

The Foundation

On October 16, 2003, The Lakewood Masonic Foundation was incorporated in the state of Ohio for the purposes of Historic Preservation, Charity and Education. The United States Internal Revenue Service subsequently determined that the Foundation is exempt from federal income tax as a 501(c)(3) organization; more particularly, a public foundation. Other 501(c)(3) organizations include groups such as charities, schools and churches. The IRS determination means that donors may deduct contributions to the Foundation for Federal income tax purposes to the extent allowed by law. Bequests, legacies, and similar gifts are deductible for Federal estate and gift tax purposes to the extent allowed by law.

Restoration and preservation of the Lakewood Masonic Temple will be the primary focus of the Foundation. Funds raised for this purpose will be granted to the Lakewood Masonic Temple Company for qualified projects which assist in restoring and maintaining the building in its original historic condition. These grants will supplement the Temple Company's traditional revenue streams from owner assessments, rentals and endowment income. The Foundation will also manage scholar-ship and philanthropic funds for individuals or organizations wishing to donate for these purposes.

The Newsletter

From the outset of its discussions, the Lakewood Masonic Foundation Board of Trustees realized that its message could best be communicated through a newsletter sent to all members of the Masonic bodies comprising the Lakewood Masonic Family. Since the Foundation primarily seeks to preserve the Lakewood Masonic Temple for future generations, it seemed only logical that the newsletter should include news of the Lakewood Masonic Temple Company as the owner and operator of the building plus the several Masonic bodies that make the Lakewood Temple their home.

The Foundation Light will be published quarterly by the Foundation. The four issues in each Masonic year will cover the periods September-October-November, December-January-February, March-April-May and June-July-August.

In this premier issue you will find news from Lakewood and Clifton-Gaston Allen Lodges; Ann Rutledge OES; the York Rite bodies of Chapter, Council and Commandery; and Beauceant. You will also find a calendar of all Masonic meetings in the Lakewood Temple, including DeMolay and Job's Daughters. We hope that all of this will help you appreciate how important it is to maintain and restore our home. Your support will go a long way toward achieving this end.

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Why Give to the Foundation?

The principal reason to support the Lakewood Masonic Foundation is your commitment to the historic preservation of our Masonic Temple, to charitable works and/or to education. Your gift to the Foundation will support these worthy purposes while providing you with deductions from your federal income tax and/or federal estate tax to the extent permitted by law. Gifts may be in the form of cash, securities or property. Gifts in the form of appreciated securities and/or charitable gift annuities can be especially beneficial to the donor.

Donors not concerned with a tax deduction and who primarily want to support the Temple building should consider donating directly to The Lakewood Masonic Temple Company rather than the Foundation. Gifts to the Temple Company's Operating Fund subsidize Temple operations and ease the financial burden on the Masonic bodies meeting in the Temple. Gifts to the Endowment Fund provide longer term support since the Fund's policy is to preserve its principal value, spending only its income on capital improvements and maintenance.

Temple Company News

The operation, maintenance and upgrading of our beloved Temple is a continuing labor of love. We are fortunate that our predecessors invested in a facility that is first class in both aesthetics and construction. But nearly 90 years later we are battling against the ravages of time, striking a delicate balance between preserving our Temple's original design and beauty and our need to operate as a cost efficient meeting space in a new century.

In recent years we have undertaken three major capital projects. Our elevator, which was not originally installed until our Temple was about 20 years old, was upgraded to meet current state requirements and to automate the doors for ease of operation. Our Lodge Room level was completely re-carpeted in colors more suited to our decorative wall art, relegating those unsightly bare spots to the dust bin of history. Both projects were funded by significant Operating Fund donations from Lakewood and Clifton-Gaston Allen Lodges, Ann Rutledge Chapter and an individual donor; supplemented by Endowment Fund income. Most recently we acquired a new high-efficiency boiler in an insurance settlement, but the additional expense of replacing leaking underground pipes was covered by Endowment Fund income.

We are currently looking to critical restoration of nearly all of our windows, both steel frame and leaded glass, as well as much needed electrical and plumbing upgrades.

We especially thank our 2003 Endowment Fund donors (listed on page 8) and look forward to your continuing support whether directly or by way of the new Lakewood Masonic Foundation.

Master's Message

Masonic Symbolism: The Acacia

The Acacia tree is found in the area known as Palestine during ancient times. Today it is found all over Africa. Acacia looks like the mulberry tree, can grow to well over one hundred feet high and is hard wood. The gum obtained from it is know as Gum Arabic. Acacia is a sacred Hebrew wood known in the scripture as "Shittah." The ark of the covenant was made from it.

Acacia is part of our initiation as Master Masons and represents the immortality of the soul, as the soul lives on after our bodies have been put to rest. Acacia can be a bush, a tree or a grove of trees. If you cut it down, it grows back; if you burn it, it grows back. If you try to dig it up and leave one root, it will grow back. Acacia can live through floods, droughts and bad soil conditions. There is little doubt to the reason Acacia is our symbol of immortality.

The Oldest Masonic Lodge

Aitchison's Haven, a Masonic lodge in Musselburgh, Scotland, has the oldest written records—they date back to January 9, 1599. It ceased to exist in 1856. Mary's Chapel lodge in Edinburgh is the oldest Masonic lodge still in existence—its records date back to July 31, 1599. (From Guinness book of world Records.)

Masonic Symbolism: The Rosette

The rosette was widely used in medieval and renaissance architecture. The oldest form seems to have been a representation of a wild rose, with five petals and five pointed sepals peeking between them. The Operatives considered it as the natural equivalent of the pentagram, with all the symbolism related to that. Later, more rings of petals were occasionally added to make the rosette more alike to the garden rose. Often the number of petals was in the three, five, seven sequence. A rosette with four or eight petals is a special case, as it represents the Cross.

How Long is a Cable Tow?

In Preston's Illustrations of Masonry (1775, p. 114), there is a footnote that cites a manuscript possessed by the Lodge of Antiquity in London and which was written during the reign of James the Second which says "...Tenthly, That every master and fellow shall come to the assemblie, if itt be within fifty miles of him, if he have any warning. And if he have trespassed against the craft, to abide the award of masters and fellows." Given the mode of travel in those days it would seem that 50 miles on horseback would be equivalent to a long day's ride. Given current modes of transportation, a day of travel makes for a very long "cable-tow." The term was in common use in both Old English (Saxon) and Middle English, in spite of the fact that prominent Masonic scholars have declared it a

no voice of distress reaches his ears in vain, and no hand seeks his aid without response. purely Masonic coinage. It basically meant "rope." When a tuft of cotton was twisted into string, it became a "tau" or "tow" of cotton. Wound together, "tau wind" became "twine." Several strands of tau could be then twisted together to form a "cabled tau" or rope. We still reserve the name "cable" for heavy lines of twisted fiber, especially for steel wire. Operatives are shown in 16th century art carrying coils of rope for hauling tools and building materials around a work site, particularly to higher construction levels. Considering the rickety form of lashed scaffolding they used, this was probably the only safe way to raise heavy loads to upper levels. A skillful climber or worker would then have a longer cable tow than a beginner. Thus, the length of a cable tow denoted the reasonable extent of demands that could be asked of each worker.



The Lakewood Masonic Temple has a rich history. In 1912 a building committee was appointed to select a suitable site and formulate proper plans for the construction of a Masonic Temple in Lakewood. The Lakewood Masonic Temple Company was incorporated, and nine Masons were appointed to serve on the first Board of Directors.

The site for the new Temple

at Andrews and Detroit Avenues was selected and approved in 1913. James W. Chrisford was awarded the contract as architect and builder. On April 3, 1915, ground was broken. The cornerstone was laid on June 26, 1915, by Edwin S. Griffiths, Past Grand Master of the Grand Lodge of Free & Accepted Masons of Ohio.

On September 30, 1916, the Temple was dedicated. Lakewood Lodge F&AM held the first meeting in the new Temple on October 2. Other occupants at that time were Gaston G. Allen Lodge F&AM, Cunningham Chapter RAM and Lincoln Chapter OES. Today it is the home of Lakewood Lodge F&AM, Clifton-Gaston Allen Lodge F&AM, Cunningham Chapter RAM, Lakewood Council RSM, Holy Grail Commandery KT, Ann Rutledge Chapter OES, Social Order of Beauceant, DeMolay for boys and Job's Daughters for girls as well as various community groups.

The Lakewood Masonic Temple remains to this day one of Lakewood's and America's historic treasures.
